Tutoring and Mentoring Youth: The Ivy League

Elementary School

The **Popcorn Club** provides a happy and engaging environment where children in the first through sixth grades can come to receive help with their homework and improve their reading skills. Although the primary focus is on reading, the children also receive help with mathematics, science and social studies. During 2012, we continued our partnership with Longfields Elementary School in Forestville, Maryland, by introducing the Popcorn Club for Longfields students every Tuesday and Wednesday from 2:00-4:00pm. In the fall of 2012, we registered over 50 children into the reading enrichment program and provided school supplies, new shoes and holiday baskets for students who were in need of those items. Our members offered over 130 volunteer hours in an effort to improve the academic achievement of our young learners.



Middle School

The **Emerging Young Leaders (EYL) Program** strives to encourage positive self-imagining, develop leadership skills and promote positive community involvement among middle school girls. The program targeted students in the Suitland community, however, the opportunity to participate is open to any Prince George's County resident. Activities were held on the first Saturday of each month at Drew Freeman Middle School from 10:00 am - 12:00 pm. During 2012, the Emerging Young Leaders participated in team building workshops, attended political events at the State Capitol; explored personal marketing techniques; conducted community service projects including a Martin Luther King Day "Help Your Neighbor Day" challenge; and enjoyed a three-day overnight retreat to Deep Creek Lake in Accident, Maryland. A total of 34 middle school girls participated in the program in 2012 and in the fall, 12 of the girls graduated out of the program and joined the Institute for the Growth and Development of All of America's Youth that targets high school students. Our members devoted 676 hours of volunteer service by the end of the year.



High School



The goal of the **Institute for the Growth and Development of All of America's Youth (Institute GADAAAY)** is to promote the personal, social, and cultural growth and development of high school students to empower them to gain self-esteem, improve their academic status, and develop the appropriate social skills to be successful in life. During 2012, the activities were held on the first Saturday of each month at Drew Freeman Middle School from 10:00 am - 12:00 pm. The young people enrolled in the program are referred to as Institute GADAAAY Fellows. The Fellows participated in 10 workshops in 2012 geared towards the interests and concerns of teens including "Saving Our Selves (S.O.S.)," a healthy living workshop; "Sweet Dream or a Beautiful Nightmare" which focused on goal-setting; a personal growth and respect workshop;

and a workshop about how to live without excuses entitled "No More Excuses!!! Make it Happen!!!" Community service was a critical component of the Fellows' training and included donating 20 Thanksgiving baskets to the residents of Windsor Crossing Senior Apartments in Suitland, Maryland, and donating 40 hats, scarves and gloves to the Angel Tree Program to benefit their peers who have parents who are incarcerated. Each workshop was filled with spirited discussions among the youth and tools and information they could use to become productive Prince Georgians. In an effort to enrich their cultural development, the students enjoyed a trip to the Amish Country in Pennsylvania and a performance at the Publick Playhouse in Hyattsville, Maryland. Eight of the Fellows who graduated from high school in 2012 were former EYL participants and matriculated full-time to post-secondary institutions.

Parents

The success of our programs for youth is dependent upon the involvement of our students' parents. The **Parents On Track** initiative provides empowerment workshops and resources to parents in Prince George's County. The goal is to support the entire family through our programs and to equip adults with the tools and parenting skills required to meet the needs of the 21st century child. The monthly workshop series held during 2012 at Drew Freeman Middle School included presentations by professionals in natural health, counseling, life coaching, college preparation and financial aid. Each workshop was interactive and permitted the opportunity for the parents to share their experiences, concerns and techniques, thereby establishing a support network to empower parents to strengthen family bonds. During the second year of the program in 2012, we served 87 parents and provided them with 151 hours of service that included print and electronic information and resources for their families.



Awarding Scholarly Achievement



Since 1994, Charities has provided more than \$400,000.00 in scholarships to more than 350 Prince George's County students who demonstrated academic excellence or who possessed a strong desire to continue their education but were faced with financial challenges. In 2012 we awarded 29 scholarships to 21 high school seniors and eight college students who were continuing their education, based on merit and need. In addition to the monies raised through our annual fundraising activities in 2011 to support the 2012 scholarships, we received grants from four County Council Members in 2012 as follows:

A total of \$49,855, which represented more than one-half of Charities program/community outreach budget, was used to award scholarships in 2012.

Encouraging Healthy Lifestyles

Charities held its annual 5K Walk/Run/Dance for the Health of It, hosting more than 200 participants at the Watkins Regional Park in Largo, Maryland. Representatives from national and local health organizations provided free counseling and resource materials. Student volunteers received community service credit hours. During the 2012 event, we announced our contributions of \$3,000.00 to national and local health organizations to encourage community awareness and public support of health issues that especially affect women and the African American community. Checks in the amount of \$1,500.00 each were presented to the National Kidney Foundation and Autism Speaks.



Serving Families

Through a partnership with the Prince George's County Department of Social Services, Charities provides financial support for four **Adopted Families**, each headed by a single mother or grandmother. There are a total of 22 children among the four families. Each adopted family received a total of \$400.00 to purchase needed clothing, toys, games and a complete Christmas dinner. They also received a complete Thanksgiving dinner and shoes from our **Shoe Bank**.



Since our inception, Charities instituted and continues to support the **Shoe Bank**, an initiative that provides new shoes to youth of all ages. The goal of the Shoe Bank is to give children in need the confidence to attend school wearing shoes that fit properly and to help increase their self esteem. During 2012, we were able to provide 68 Prince George's County students with 81 pairs of shoes, 19 pairs of boots, and 163 pairs of socks. In addition, some students chose gloves or a hat and 18 pairs of shoelaces for a total of 286 items. Through our partnership with the Prince George's County Department of Social Services and Prince George's County Public Schools, students who received shoes and other items represented nine elementary schools, two middle schools and seven high schools. The following schools participated in 2012: Bradbury Heights Elementary School, Glassmanor Elementary School, Suitland Elementary School, Longfield Elementary School, Robert Gray Elementary School, William Beans Elementary School, Capital Heights Elementary School, Concord Elementary School, Overlook Elementary School, Drew Freeman Middle School, Thurgood Marshall Middle School, Largo High School, Suitland High School, Henry Wise Jr. High School, Charles H. Flowers High School, Forestville Military Academy, Central High School, and Friendly High School. This year we accepted high school students who resided in the shelters we supported or were family members of young participants. In addition, we provided gift cards for the families we support at the Family Crisis Center of Prince George's County.



In 2012, our volunteers collected over 500 non-perishable food items that produced 98 delivery bags that were presented to families who were struggling financially or facing foreclosure in support of Prince George's County's annual **Martin Luther King Day of Remembrance and Community Service**. In addition, through our annual fall **Tools for Schools** program, our volunteers delivered a total of 143 backpacks to area schools in 2012. Capitol Heights Elementary School, Longfields Elementary School, and Seat Pleasant Elementary School each received 30 backpacks filled with school supplies. The children within our **Adopted Families** received 10 backpacks with school supplies appropriate for their specific ages and grade levels. The **Popcorn Club** students were given backpacks with supplies and special bags of teacher supplies were prepared and distributed to the schools. We also purchased an additional 10 backpacks and supplies that were delivered to the **Family Crisis Center of Prince George's County**.



As the philanthropic arm of the Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., Iota Gamma Omega Chapter, Ivy Community Charities' volunteers partnered with our sister Prince George's County chapters, Upsilon Tau Omega, Psi Epsilon Omega and Eta Chapter at Bowie State University to adopt two bedrooms and bathrooms at the **Shepherd's Cove Shelter for Domestic Violence** in Capital Heights, Maryland. Charities provided approximately \$2,000.00 that volunteers used to paint, clean and equip the facility with two flat screen televisions, 12 pillows, 15 blankets, 12 sheets, and 15 towel sets that will all remain with the families. Our contributions helped to provide a safe haven for 11 women and families in need of shelter and protection.



For a second year, we continued our partnership with the Mall of Prince George's located in Hyattsville, Maryland, by providing Christmas gifts to the **Angel Tree Project**. This special event was established to brighten the holidays for children of incarcerated parents and disadvantaged children throughout the county. More than 550 gifts were donated to support the program. A total of 150 gifts for children and women were donated to Shepherd's Cove, a shelter for abused and homeless women and their children; 50 gifts were provided to the Family Crisis Center's Domestic Violence Shelter; 200 gifts were donated to 100 children of incarcerated parents; approximately 50 Popcorn Club students in need received gifts; and 45 gifts were provided to the 22 children of our **Adopted Families**.





Supporting the Cultural Arts

Charities continued its support for the arts as a sponsor of the 13th Annual Harlem Renaissance Festival, a unique program established in Prince George's County to recognize the revitalization of the arts. The free event featured an array of activities for all ages, including health screenings, book signings, musical artists and dynamic panel discussions on topics pertinent to improving the quality of life for Prince Georgians. Charities Member Dorothy Bailey is the Founder of the Harlem Renaissance Foundation and Charities Founding President Erma W. Barron and Rochelle Andrews, Charities Resource Development Chair, serve on the Board of Directors of the Harlem Renaissance Foundation.

Honoring the Elderly

Each month our volunteers, known as the **Sunshine Club**, provided assistance to the elderly residents of the Forestville Health and Rehabilitation Center by playing games, reading, singing, setting manicures and providing general companionship. In 2012 our members contributed nearly \$1,000.00 to purchase seven chairs for the residents of the Forestville Health and Rehabilitation Center. In addition, more than 200 toiletry items were provided for 232 elderly persons. The Sunshine Club provided over 100 volunteer hours serving the residents.



In 2012, Charities held its 19th Annual Cotillion~Beautillion at The Villa in Beltsville, Maryland, where six young women who were seniors in area high schools were introduced to society. The debutantes and their escorts rehearsed for four months to learn a variety of dance techniques including the minuet, the waltz, and a contemporary dance performed in memory of the late Whitney Houston. Although the event was a fundraiser that helped to finance our programs, it also served as a cultural enrichment program to introduce high school juniors and seniors to society by providing training in social manners and etiquette.



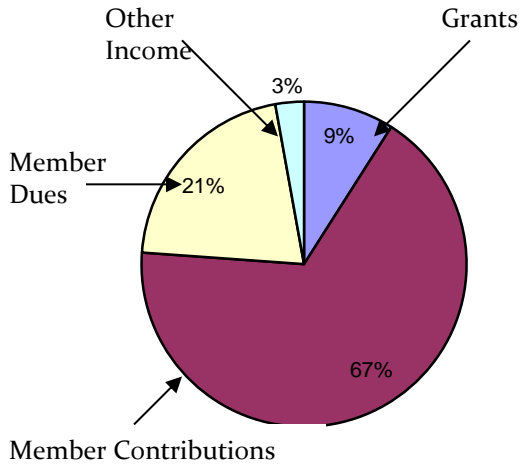
Expanding Global Service

In 2012, we expanded our services beyond the United States by joining Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., in an international relationship with the Heifer Foundation. The organization provides livestock to persons in developing countries so they can learn to provide for themselves and create their own economic wealth. In 2012, 103 of our members contributed \$1,106.00 in individual donations and Charities donated \$200.00 toward this worthwhile effort.

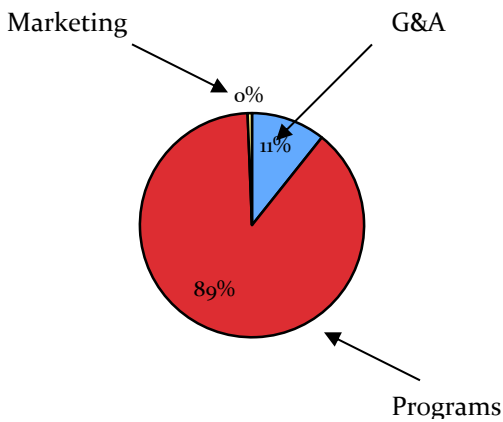


Financial Highlights of 2012

The Ivy Youth and Family Center ... From Vision (1998) To Reality (2012)

“Blessed is she who believes that what the Lord has said to her will be accomplished.” Luke 1:45

In 1998, then President Cheryl Petty Garnette presented a vision of a facility where Charities would house the community service activities that it funds on behalf of the Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., Iota Gamma Omega Chapter located in Prince George’s County, Maryland. In support of this vision, the first official capital campaign was launched in 1999 as the members of the organization were asked to contribute \$199.00 followed by a similar campaign in 2000 when the members were asked to contribute \$200.00 toward the acquisition of a facility. Then Executive Director Erma W. Barron (the organization’s Founding President) helped to construct the concept of the facility, which she named the Ivy Youth and Family Center. In 2004, President Carolyn N. Pinckney and Executive Director Barron successfully lobbied on behalf of the organization to receive two bond bill grants totaling \$500,000.00 from the State of Maryland. The bills were sponsored by then State Senators Gloria Lawlah and Nathaniel Exum, along with Delegate Carolyn J. B. Howard. Over the years, a variety of fundraisers were held. In addition, several building options were researched, however, none of them proved to be fruitful.

In 2011, President Ingrid S. Harrison and Executive Director Cheryl Petty Garnette requested an extension of the bond bills to allow the organization an additional year to find an appropriate facility. The legislation requesting the extension was sponsored by Delegate Carolyn J.B. Howard and State Senator Joann Benson and was enacted by the General Assembly in 2011. In that same year, a Strategic Planning Team was established by Executive Director Garnette that was led by Board Member and Building Acquisition Chair Rosalind Daniel Walker with the expressed purpose to secure the funds and the facility by the December 1, 2012 deadline. Rather than considering a massive space of 20,000-24,000 square feet as was originally conceived, the Strategic Planning Team turned its focus to securing a smaller facility of no more than 7,000 square feet. Mrs. Walker identified the property at 6118 Walton Avenue and its adjacent vacant lot in September 2011 and in September 2012, we secured the State funds to purchase the property. In November 2012 with the assistance of Attorney Arthur J. Horne, Jr., the County Council approved our request to use the property for eleemosynary and philanthropic purposes.

We are particularly pleased that our site is located in Suitland, Maryland. Prince George’s County Executive Rushern L. Baker, III, identified the Suitland community as one of six targeted communities in his Transforming Neighborhoods Initiative. The Ivy Youth and Family Center will allow us to partner strategically and effectively to address the needs of the citizens of Prince George’s County in general, and the Suitland community in particular, and to become a model of effective nonprofit business practices in the county.

Charities is indebted to the members of the Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., Iota Gamma Omega Chapter; the members of the County Council especially Mr. Melvin Franklin, Mr. Derrick Leon Davis, Ms. Mary A. Lehman, Mr. Obie Patterson, Ms. Karen R. Toles, and Ms. Ingrid M. Turner who sponsored the local site legislation; Shipley and Horne, Attorneys at Law and specifically Mr. Arthur J. Horne, Jr.; the State of Maryland Department of Public Works and Office of the Comptroller including Ms. Cathy Ensor, Ms. Fran Vehstedt and Ms. Rehema Retuma; Delegate Carolyn J. B. Howard and State Senator Joann Benson; and the members of the community for their collective support of this effort.

All of Charities’ fundraising efforts were used to support its capital campaign in 2012. In addition, members were asked to contribute \$650.00 to meet our goal to raise \$300,000.00 by November 2012. These combined efforts including individual member contributions generated total income of approximately \$100,000.00. Members who met the financial challenge by November 2012 received pink hard hats to commemorate their 2011-2012 contribution to the acquisition of the Ivy Youth and Family Center. The capital campaign is perpetual, therefore, Charities continues to solicit the financial support of its members and the community. A summary of individual and business contributors since the first financial campaign was launched is presented on the next pages.
